THE long-awaited new Te Urewera visitor/information centre is one step nearer to becoming reality with initial geo-technical investigations under way.

The location of the new facility, which L is a collaboration between Ngai Tuhoe and the Department of Conservation, is being kept under wraps at this stage.

DoC partnerships manager for Eastern Bay of Plenty Mike Jones said the geo-technical investigation was the key next step. He said until everything was set for the build to begin, Ngai Tuhoe and DoC would continue to explore the concept design.

Geotechnical investigations are performed by geotechnical engineers or engineering geologists to obtain information on the physical properties wof soil and rock around a site to design earthworks and foundations for proposed structures and for repair of distress to earthworks and structures caused by subsurface conditions.

ra include surface exploration and subsurface exploration of a site.

In an earlier Wairoa Star article Yuhoe Te Uru Taumatua CEO Kirstich Luke said she hoped it might be opened before the end of the year.

The new facility will house many taonga and artefacts formerly on display at Aniwaniwa and in storage id since 2012.

Both DoC and Tuhoe are collaborating to provide a proud Te Ureweralia Waikaremoana visitor experience. Mstuke had said the facility would offer a greater insight into the Tuhoe-Te Urewera relationship.
