After receiving requests from family members of those 77 men, Mr Waaka said he agreed to take the flags around Tuhoe territory.

On Monday he took the flags from Tuhoe's tribal headquarters, Te Kura

headquarters, Te Kura Whare, in Taneatua to Waikaremoana before travelling back to Ruatoki in time for the Armistice Day celebrations tomorrow.

On his way back, he also called into other settlements so that the descendants of those Tuhoe soliders who fought in World War I could see the flags.

"Each of these flags represents the years of their dedication to God, King and country of whom they served with distinction, bravery and honour as they upheld the mana, ihi and wehi for their

whanau, hapu, iwi, waka and as a Maori."

The commemorations begin at 6am with the raising of flags representing Belgium, France and New Zealand. Later in the morning, following a powhiri, poppies will be laid on white crosses before New Zealand Defence Force personnel march onto the

marae.

At 11am the bell will toll, and wreaths will be laid to commemorate the fallen soldiers, followed by a service delivered by the padre.

This year, the commemorations will also involve remembering John Teihi Claude "Corky" McCorkindale, who died earlier this year.

Mr Waaka said Mr McCorkindale was "the voice of our RSA within Ruatoki".

"He is united with the many elders of our RSA veterans from both world wars to all conflicts within Asia and to those veterans who lie in faraway cemeteries of the Commonwealth. It was you who lifted the memories of sadness to the widows and children of these veterans.

"You were responsible for the gathering of the many whanau who came to remember and pay accolades of teams and tributes. You welcomed everyone from all around the regions of Mataatua on many Anzac Day remembrances for over 20 years.

"This coming Anzac for 2018, as we remember our loved ones, so do we remem-

ber you.

"You have left a huge gap with your passing away. And so, to you Corky, gone but not forgotten from us here in the valley of Ruatoki and surrounding districts of Mataatua – Lest we forget."
